

Service Notes | Sundays after Pentecost

For centuries, the Christian Church has worshiped according to the Church Year. The Church Year begins in December with the season of Advent. The first six months of the church year (December through May/June) follow the life of Christ from his birth until his suffering, death, and resurrection on Easter Sunday. Last Sunday, the Festival of the Holy Trinity marked the beginning of the second half of the church year. The second six months of the church year (June through November) follow the teachings of Christ.

Over the next six weeks, the Sunday's readings are all connected by a theme of power. Jesus, the King of kings, is the almighty ruler of heaven and earth who, by his power defeated death, sin, and Satan for us. With that almighty power, he reigns Satan and his evil minions in. With that almighty power, he makes creation bend her knee and conquerors our greatest fears. With that almighty power, he sends his Spirit to plant faith in your heart. With that almighty power, he preserves your faith. With that almighty power, he sends you with his Word. With that almighty power, he gives his Word which you speak power to grow his kingdom. With that almighty power, he gives you the power to stand up to the Gospel's opposition, no matter what the cost.

Over these six weeks, we have the opportunity to marvel and glorify the Son of God for the power he wields to protect us, preserve us, send us, and grow us.



L In peace, let us pray to the Lord


For the well-being of all people everywhere, that they may receive from you all they need to sustain body and life, hear our prayer, O Lord.

² The word Kyrie is a Greek word from the phrase Kyrie Elieson which means, "Lord, have mercy!" This is the most heartfelt cry of a believer to his Lord. It is not a cry for forgiveness, but a cry for mercy that our Lord and king hear us and help us in our necessities and trouble. This morning, may it be our heartfelt cry to our Lord and King.

³ This ancient song of the church gets its name from its first few words in Latin: Gloria in Excelsis Deo! This was the greatest song of praise ever heard on earth. An angel choir sang it in the Judean sky the night Jesus was born (Luke 2:14). This song has been sung in Christian churches for 1500 years. As Martin Luther once said, "This ancient song did grow, nor was it made, but it came from heaven."

Second Reading | Acts 27:13-26 |

¹³ When a gentle south wind began to blow, they saw their opportunity; so they weighed anchor and sailed along the shore of Crete. ¹⁴ Before very long, a wind of hurricane force, called the Northeaster, swept down from the island. ¹⁵ The ship was caught by the storm and could not head into the wind; so we gave way to it and were driven along. ¹⁶ As we passed to the lee of a small island called Cauda, we were hardly able to make the lifeboat secure, ¹⁷ so the men hoisted it aboard. Then they passed ropes under the ship itself to hold it together. Because they were afraid they would run aground on the sandbars of Syrtis, they lowered the sea anchor and let the ship be driven along. ¹⁸ We took such a violent battering from the storm that the next day they began to throw the cargo overboard. ¹⁹ On the third day, they threw the ship's tackle overboard with their own hands. ²⁰ When neither sun nor stars appeared for many days and the storm continued raging, we finally gave up all hope of being saved.

²¹ After they had gone a long time without food, Paul stood up before them and said: "Men, you should have taken my advice not to sail from Crete; then you would have spared yourselves this damage and loss. ²² But now I urge you to keep up your courage, because not one of you will be lost; only the ship will be destroyed. ²³ Last night an angel of the God to whom I belong and whom I serve stood beside me ²⁴ and said, 'Do not be afraid, Paul. You must stand trial before Caesar; and God has graciously given you the lives of all who sail with you.' ²⁵ So keep up your courage, men, for I have faith in God that it will happen just as he told me. ²⁶ Nevertheless, we must run aground on some island."

The disciples woke him and said to him, "Teacher, don't you care if we drown?"

³⁹ He got up, rebuked the wind and said to the waves, "Quiet! Be still!" Then the wind died down and it was completely calm.

⁴⁰He said to his disciples, "Why are you so afraid? Do you still have no faith?"

⁴¹They were terrified and asked each other, "Who is this? Even the wind and the waves obey him!"

Confession of Faith | Nicene Creed |

└ Our Lord Jesus Christ, on the night he was betrayed, took bread; and when he had given thanks, he broke it and gave it to his disciples, saying, "Take and eat; this is my body, which is given for you. Do this in remembrance of me."

Then he took the cup, gave thanks, and gave it to them, saying, "Drink from it all of you; this is my blood of the new covenant, which is poured out for you for the forgiveness of sins. Do this, whenever you drink it, it remembrance of me.



Song of Departure | Amazing Grace⁵ |



⁵ One of the most well-known hymns in the world, "Amazing Grace" was written by John Newton, a slave trader and sea captain who knew well both sin and grace. Brought to faith by God, John Newton left that world behind and served as a pastor for 35 years. His grave marker in an England cemetery is engraved with words he wrote for himself: "John Newton, clerk, once an Infidel and Libertine, a servant of slavers in Africa, was, by the rich Mercy of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ, preserved, restored, pardoned, and appointed to preach the Faith he had long labored to destroy."

Communion at Huntersville Lutheran

We believe what God's Word says. God's Word clearly teaches that along with the bread and wine we receive Christ's body and blood for the forgiveness of sins (Matthew 26:26, 28; Mark 14:22, 24; Luke 22:19-22). Communion is important to us at Huntersville Lutheran and we seek to honor the biblical view of communion. Before coming up for communion, all adults should ask themselves these questions:

- 1. Do you confess your sins and seek to turn away from the sins you confessed?
- 2. Do you recognize that Jesus' sacrifice on the cross is the only way sin is forgiven?
- 3. Do you recognize that in the Sacrament of Communion you receive Jesus' true body and blood along with the bread and the wine?
- 4. Do you believe that the Bible *IS* God's inspired Word and does not just contain some truths of God?
- 5. Do you believe that Huntersville Lutheran Church teaches only the truth of God based on His inspired Word? (A summary of these teachings is taught in Faithbuilders, a class that runs multiple times throughout the year.).

We ask that those who have not had the opportunity to understand our Scriptural confession and are unsure of the answers to the above questions would speak with the pastor before participating in the Lord's Supper this morning. It is our sincere desire to share in the blessings of the Lord's Supper with you according to the pattern Jesus himself has given in his Word.



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
